A Season of Mindfulness

“For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven.” (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

Friends,

Church life tends to be delineated by “seasons.” The church year begins with the season of Advent and then moves quickly into the seasons of Epiphany, Lent, and Pentecost. Each of these seasons carries with them certain traditions and practices that, when incorporated into our daily lives, encourage us to explore our faith, grow in wisdom, and mature in both spiritual practice and commitment to the Lord.

But there are other *seasons* in life that foster growth as well. The writer of Ecclesiastes reminds us that there is a season and a time for “every matter under heaven.” With the season of a “new year” upon us, the “matter” of turning the calendar page on January 1 could awaken within us the desire to reorganize, restore, and reprioritize our lives. Many of us will begin the new year with “resolutions” of things we intend to do, behaviors we hope to model, good habits we choose to adopt or bad habits we choose to give up. Much of the time, these resolutions have to do with some form of self-improvement: losing weight, exercising more, getting out of debt, securing a better job, or finding ways to manage stress and improve our attitude. Not surprisingly, some of us have more “resolve” than others, making those “improvements” stick. Some of us, though, will slip back into old patterns in just a few weeks’ (days’?) time and get angry or frustrated with ourselves for our seeming lack of self-discipline.

Rather than approach this new year as a *season of self-improvement*, which may leave us feeling less satisfied than before, I would encourage us to approach this as a *season of mindfulness*. In his new book, *The Path to Prosperity*, economist Jeffrey Sachs suggests that *mindfulness* can be a solid path to well-being. In taking a broad, holistic approach to the study of economy, Sachs contends that if our American society is to provide a better path to prosperity for all citizens and (in my words) “up the happiness quotient” for everyone, we must work at becoming increasingly mindful of the choices we make—and we must do so starting at home, with ourselves.

For Sachs, working toward social prosperity comes down to regaining the balance in our lives “between work and leisure, saving and consumption, self-interest and compassion, (and) individualism and citizenship.” He offers up several dimensions of mindfulness that seem crucial to regaining control, finding satisfaction in a moderate lifestyle, and discovering happiness in our relationships. Some of these include:

Mindfulness of self: personal moderation—to escape mass consumerism and understand the sources of our own happiness

Mindfulness of work: the balancing of work and leisure

Mindfulness of others: the exercise of compassion and cooperation

Mindfulness of the world: the acceptance of diversity as a path to peace

As we start this new year, I ask you to consider: What makes you happy? What makes your marriage rich in love, companionship and commitment? What makes your friendships meaningful? What makes your relationship with God strong, compelling and intimate? What makes you feel at peace: with yourself, with God, and with the world around you? And, if you are not feeling *happy, rich in love*, and generally *at peace*, why not? And what might you do about it? Chances are, the thing that most makes you happy and brings you fulfillment is your *choice* to be a responsible part of a *community* working together for the good of all God’s kingdom children.

Of course, every life is a journey and few, if any, of us ever has complete happiness, fulfillment and peace at every single moment of every single day. But each of us has the capacity for a rich and full life. And so, as this new year begins, may we seek to be more mindful—of ourselves, our God, and the world around us—that we might grow to discover true physical, spiritual, emotional and financial balance in our lives. As we choose to make this a *Season of Mindfulness*, I invite you to join me in seeking joy, peace and fulfillment, taking advantage of the opportunities for exploring “mindfulness” and “balance” that will be made available to you this month.

Summary of December Stated Session Meeting

The Session met on December 13, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. in the Chapel Lane narthex and the parlor. This meeting served as the annual consultation between the Session and the Board of Deacons. In addition to receiving the regular monthly reports from the clerk, pastor, finance and other boards, the session highlights are as follows:

- *Set* officers' training for new elders and deacons for Saturday, January 7.
- *Called* for a Special Session Meeting on January 15, following the 10:45 a.m. worship service. The purpose of the meeting will be to examine and receive statements of faith from the new elders and deacons.
- *Approved* Sunday, January 29 as the date for the ordination and/or installation for the newly elected deacons and elders during the 10:45 a.m. worship service.
- *Set* Sunday, February 12, 2012 as the date for the Annual Congregational Meeting, immediately following the 10:45 a.m. worship service.
- *Authorized* the pastor to administer communion during 2012 to the sick and those isolated from public worship, to be assisted when possible by an elder or deacon.
- *Approved* the serving of communion each Sunday at the 8:30 a.m. service, once a month at the 10:45 a.m. Sunday service and the Wednesday 7:00 p.m. service, and at special services throughout 2012.
- *Elected* the following people for 2012: Carol Jacobs and Bill Coats (Co-Treasurers), Erlene Carmody (Financial Secretary), Florence Goethe (Youth Financial Secretary) and Suz Miller (Clerk of Session).
- Upon recommendation of the Board of Deacons, *approved* the receiving and distribution of the following Special Offerings for 2012: One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peacemaking, Christmas Joy and Christmas Eve.
- *Approved*, also, that the Deacons receive and forward to Presbytery, the Two-Coins-A-Meal; and receive and distribute Share Fair contributions.
- *Approved* the request from the First Presbyterian Church of Stuart, Florida that Tony and Beverly Theobald's membership be transferred to that church.
- *Reported* that Chapel Lane member, Nida O'Dell, died on November 13, 2011 in Midland, Michigan; and that Chapel Lane member Leslie Stuart died on November 18, 2011 in Midland. We are grateful for Nida's and Leslie's active participation in the life of the church, and regretfully have removed them from the active church rolls.

- *Discussed* the preliminary Chapel Lane Budget for 2012, which will be voted upon at the January 10 stated session meeting.
- *Received* the staff job performance reviews, and the pastor's six-month performance review.
- *Approved* that Boards may appoint co-opted members to assist in the work of the Board. The co-opted members would be granted voice, but not vote.
- *Approved* that the Gifts and Memorials Committee may announce plans for Finance and Life Planning Seminars, and distribute a congregational survey to discern interest in the seminars.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer at 10:10 p.m. The next stated meeting will be at 7:00 p.m., January 10 in the parlor.

Can You Help?

The season of Lent will approach quickly and we would like to publish a take-home Lenten devotional for all the members of the congregation to use for daily mindfulness, study and prayer.

The word “lent,” as you may know, is derived from the Middle English “lente” which means both “springtime” and “lengthen” (as in, “the days lengthen”). The themes of Lent include: repentance, sacrifice, humility, renewal, and transformation—to name a few!

Lent is a time of remembering that Christ offered his life for the redemption of the world and that, because he lives, we also shall live. It is a season of thanksgiving for the grace that binds us in love, marks us as “forgiven,” and makes us new each day. It is also a season of faithful witness to the power of the gospel to change lives.

While we could buy and circulate a Lenten devotional booklet written by one of the big Christian publishing houses, we would prefer to self-publish a small booklet prepared by Chapel Lane for Chapel Lane. To do that, though, we need your help.

Please consider offering up a one-page submission for inclusion in a devotional. It might be an essay, a story, a remembrance, a poem, some lyrics to a song you've written, or a sketch you've drawn. Whatever you choose to offer shall be fine—remember: it is a thank offering for all that Jesus offers you. Just let it flow from your heart.

You can make the editor's job easier by including an appropriate sentence or two from scripture and a short prayer to make a complete devotion. (If not, we will include these for you.)

If you would like to use the daily lectionary to help you in selecting a scripture, you can borrow the *2012 Mission Yearbook for Prayer and Study* from the Church Library. It includes a daily lectionary. Or, you can go to the church website, www.chapellane.org, link to the P.C.(U.S.A.) through the “About Us” folder, and choose to “follow the lectionary” under the scripture text of the day. If all else fails, call Pastor Rhonda, Chrissy Westbury, or Karen Graef and we will be happy to help.

You may request a date for your submission and we will do all that we can to honor your request. (Note that the dates of the devotional will run from February 22 to April 8, Ash Wednesday to Easter.)

Deacons' Doings

Highlights of the Deacons' December 13, 2011 Meeting

The Board of Deacons met first with the Session and the adjourned to the Library for the remainder of the evening. The following are highlights of the meeting:

1. New members were welcomed. They include Karen Adams (Class of 2003), and Freedom Scott, Alice Wiltse and Beverly Moyer (Class of 2014). Beverly was not able to be present.
2. The 2011 Christmas Eve Offerings designated for the Toni and Trish House by the Board in October was approved by Session.
3. The Session approved the four Special Offerings for 2012. They include: One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peacemaking and the Christmas Joy Offering. In addition, the Deacons were authorized to designate where the local funds from Pentecost and Peacemaking would be utilized.
4. The Session also approved the 2012 Christmas Eve Offerings and gave authority to the Board of Deacons to designate the recipient.
5. The first Mobile Food Pantry of 2012 will be on Wednesday, January 18 at the Midland Ice Arena.
6. The following disbursements were made since the October 21, 2011, meeting. (There was no meeting in November.) **Peacemaking Offering** total was \$654.00, with 75% (\$490.50) paid to Lake Huron Presbytery and 25% (\$163.50) paid to Shelterhouse of Midland. **4Q Emergency Relief** of \$500.00 was paid to Midland Area Homes to support a local family. A refund of \$12.58 was paid to Beverly Moyer for **prayer shawl yarn**. The balance of \$493.87 in the Member-In-Mission budget account was paid to Gail McGee for her December, **Haiti Medical Mission Trip** expenses, and \$800.00 was paid to Gail for **Medical Supplies**. **Mailing of cookies** to 19 college students was \$98.46. **Pastor's Emergency Fund (PEF)** expenses from the budget account totaled \$340.68 and \$198.00 from the equity account (on-going donations). **Congregational Care** assistance totaled \$126.99. 4Q payment of \$3,250.00 was paid to **Lake Huron Presbytery as part of General Mission**. **Share Fair** donations included \$452.00 to the **Emergency Food Pantry Network (EFPN)**, \$501.00 to **Habitat for Humanity**, \$1,348.00 to **Heifer International**, \$298.00 to **Pastor Sigita's Orphanage**, refunds of \$49.80, \$92.97, \$154.10 were paid to Linda Kennedy, Alice Wiltse and Kerry Buell for **Star Gift purchases**, **2-Coins-A-Meal** payments of \$102.28 for October and \$152.90 for November were made to Lake Huron Presbytery and a refund of \$26.84 was paid to Nancy Vander Woude for **Thanksgiving and Christmas** card mailing.
7. The Visitation budget account balance of \$28.44 and the Miscellaneous budget account balance of \$201.76 totaled \$230.20. The Board designated Open Door of Midland as the recipient of the combined total.
8. The Board designated Open Door and/or The Diaper Bank (both of Midland) as the recipient (s) of any balance remaining in the Congregational Care budget account near the end of December. The amount to be distributed to one or both agencies will be determined by Pastor Myers.
9. The Board designated Elder-Deacon Dan Veresh to contact Chrissy Westbury as to her plans for the youth to sponsor a "Souper" Bowl Sunday on the Super Bowl Sunday 2012. If the youth do not plan to sponsor such an event (in which a can/box/bag of soup is brought by those attending worship on that Sunday), then the Deacons will sponsor the event if authorized by the Session at its January 2012 meeting. The soup will be given to the HELP food pantry at Memorial Presbyterian Church.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Deacons will be on Tuesday, January 24, 2012, at 7:00 p.m. in the church library.



Though it will be years before we have direct images of the surfaces of these worlds, this show gives us an idea of what they might look like – up close and personal!


