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Pastor's Letter—October 2013

My dear Chapel Lane family and friends,

I was very touched on a recent Sunday morning when Suz and Sandy Miller said their good-byes to us before moving to Colorado and, in sharing her joy for the honor of serving this congregation and the P.C.(U.S.A.) for so many years, our former Clerk promised to pray for us and for our ministry. She said her prayer will be that this wonderful, thriving church at the corner of Chapel Lane and Jefferson Avenue may continue to serve Christ and the people of Midland with its valuable Christian witness for many years to come.

I suspect that we all feel, like Suz, that Chapel Lane offers a unique and valuable ministry to our community, and that we are called by God to support that ministry with our time, talents, resources and prayers. I also suspect that each of us has a story we could tell of what it means to be a part of this unique Christian community. Thanks be to God for memorial gifts and extra commitment giving that helped us pay for a good many of the non-budgeted expenses over the course of the past year. I must confess, though, that it would be wonderful if we could do more than just keep current on our expenses. It would be an awesome testimony of our trust in God's providence and our faith in the witness of Christ through the ministry of Chapel Lane Presbyterian Church if we were to have sufficient resources to grow further opportunities for worship, study, service, outreach, and fellowship in this place. Emergency Relief Recipients:

The Board of Deacons voted to assist two local programs with the 4Q 2013 emergency relief budget line item of \$450. The new community school model program at Eastlawn Elementary School received \$100 for school supplies. The Midland County Emergency Food Pantry Network received \$350 for the Backpack Buddies program. Children in grades K-5 will benefit from our monetary gifts.

A.J. Jacobs is an “immersion journalist.” As such he “immerses” himself in his subject and then writes about it. As a non-practicing Jew and a self-avowed atheist, he set out to live according to Biblical scripture for a year. He followed rules and observances he found from studying the Bible in several versions, Bible reference books, and consulting several religious Judeo-Christian advisors. The book he wrote, published in 2007, is “**The Year of Living Biblically: One Man’s Humble Quest to Follow the Bible as Literally as Possible.**”

He says, on page 7, “It’s impossible to immerse yourself in religion for twelve months and emerge unaffected.” So with humor and some profound thoughts he reveals how he changed, how he hopes he became a better person, and how “sometimes you have to look beyond the weirdness.” (page 87)

And other produce that would arrive in totes and would have to be sorted into individual plastic shopping bags for clients to receive at the pantries throughout Midland County. The truck from Hidden Harvest would schedule to arrive on a specific day once the warehouse is ready (October?) to receive the food.
