Pastor’s Letter—March 2014

“(T)he heavens are the work of your fingers.”

(Psalm 8:3)

Dear Chapel Lane Family,

Author John Indermark put it quite succinctly: “The Old Testament is law; the New Testament is grace. That misconception has plagued the church and Christian theology—not to mention Jewish-Christian relationships—for almost two millennia. The truth of the matter is that grace weaves its course throughout the Hebrew Scriptures, often coming to the fore at critical junctures. Nowhere is that revelation clearer in the Hebrew Scriptures than in Genesis. This book of ‘beginnings’ (as Genesis literally means) declares God’s disposition toward humanity and creation to be a fundamentally gracious one. That is, God consistently does for us what we cannot do for ourselves or what we have done nothing to merit.”

John Indermark is so convicted of this truth, that God is and always has been a God of Grace, that he wrote an entire book on the subject awhile back, and entitled it “Genesis of Grace: A Lenten Book of Days.” Unfortunately, this book is now out of print and hard to find. However, I have managed to put my hands on about 40 copies and I invite you to explore its contents with me.

We will use our Wednesday nights in Lent to explore the “Genesis of Grace” through our mid-week worship, revisiting the stories and characters of the book of Genesis with—what I hope to be—a fresh imagination, some new connections, and a prayer for deepening faith. And we will use our Thursday afternoon study time to reflect further on this God of grace and essential providence who, at one and the same time, touches our hearts with mercy, marks our steps with identity, guides our lives with purpose, and serves as our spiritual rudder even when the stormy seas of distrust, doubt, fear and grief would threaten to overwhelm us and leave us soul-shattered and ship-wrecked.

On Ash Wednesday, we will celebrate the imagery of God’s fingers at work in creation, including the affirmation of Genesis 1:26 that we are created in God’s image. Bearing ‘within ourselves’ the imprint of God’s presence, we will approach the altar of grace at the start of Lent to be marked by ashes—with a fingerprint that is reminiscent of the Creator at work upon us.

In the weeks that follow, we will share in mid-week services of lessons, songs and reflections that will explore the gift of God’s grace through a rich variety of scriptural accounts and spiritual lenses. Moving beyond the outdated prescription of the Old Testament as a book of Law that describes an angry and vengeful God and the New Testament as a book of Grace that describes a loving and compassionate God, we will look at the evidence of a graceful God from the dawn of time as we consider such rich Genesis themes as:

- March 12 **“Matters of the Heart”** (Grief, Tragedy, Covenant, Remembrance, and Response)
- March 19 **“Journeys”** (Birth, Identity, Laughter, and Trust)
- March 26 **“The Eye of the Storm”** (Just what it sounds like—being at the eye of a storm and seeking aid.)
- April 2 **“Unlikely Choices”** (The Search for Sanctuary, Bargaining with God, and New Name/New Identity)
- April 9 **“Irrepressible Providence”** (Loyalty, Remembrance, and a Power that Forgives)

I know that a study of Genesis during Lent might seem a bit unusual—we usually look to the New Testament during this holy season. But I invite you to take a risk and do something a bit different during this time of renewal, atonement, and spiritual discovery. Join me in stepping out on a Genesis walk of faith, experiencing the path of grace in a whole new way. May God bless us with a holy Lent,

The One Great Hour of Sharing special offering began immediately following World War II for the relief and reconstruction of areas devastated by the war, primarily Europe and Asia.

In March 1949 an estimated 75,000 churches of many denominations participated. The program continues today, 65 years later, as an ecumenical effort. Each denomination allocates its gifts differently but all use their funds for ministries of disaster relief, refugee assistance and development aid. Today One Great Hour of Sharing reaches those in need in more than 100 countries. In recent years Presbyterians have given about \$8 million annually.

Posters and bulletin inserts will provide details of the efforts supported by the offering to be received on Easter Sunday, April 20th. PC (USA) divides the offering between three programs: Self Development of People (32%), Presbyterian Hunger Program (36%), and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (32%). Please consider supporting these programs. Special envelopes are available in the pew racks and in the kiosk (Deacons' area). Please make checks payable to Chapel Lane and indicate OGHS on the memo line. You will also find fish banks for coins to be used by children or adults.

Supplies for Haiti:

As most of you are aware, Gail McGee makes four trips a year with her medical teams to Haiti. Gail's next trip will be in March, 2014. The Board of Deacons wants to offer you a way to help Gail care for the people of Haiti by providing a list of over the counter medications to take on her next trip. You may purchase any of the supplies and place them in a plastic box labeled "Haiti" in the church foyer near the donation table. The dollar stores are a great place to buy these supplies.

- * **GI Meds:** Tums, Pepto-Bismol chews, Pepcid, Zantac
 - * **Topical creams:** Hydrocortisone, triple antibiotic, anti fungal, anti-itch, A&D, Cetaphil, Vitamin E., muscle rub
 - * **Wound care:** gauzes, tape, bandages, band aids
 - * **Miscellaneous:** Vicks rub, infant gas relief, poly-sol vitamins, kid's vitamins, sandwich bags with zipper, Dixie cups, condiment cups with lids
- Note: empty medicine bottles are not longer needed.**

Community Program Overview:

What is the SHARE program?

SHARE is an ecumenical Christian summer day camp, administered by the Salvation Army, which provides a loving, structured, and enriching experience for many Midland County children. Our objective is to share the Christian message in word and deed. To achieve this we train counselors who are recommended and sponsored by local churches. With these counselors we plan events and activities for children that promote their individual growth spiritually, emotionally, physically and educationally.

How can our church help?

Prayer support is vital to the success of the program. We want to glorify Him in all our efforts so pray in early spring as staff is being selected that we have His wisdom and discernment. Pray that the children and families are impacted and that they come to a relationship with Christ. Finally we always need prayers of encouragement for the staff as summer continues. Also pray for the staff to have a fuller picture of God's love and His will for their lives.

Local churches recommend and/or financially support young adults for our staff. SHARE has maintained a synergy over many years because our supporters recognize that we can do together what we could not do individually. This system of church sponsorship also aids in finding the highest caliber staff. Since SHARE is held over the summer, we are able to capture many highly intelligent and talented college-aged young men and women during their summer break. This is an opportune time to educate and activate them on how to meet this community need. Many of the children we serve would not otherwise have adult supervision.

All donations are used for direct program expenses. Staffing, fieldtrip transportation, and supplies are the largest expenses of the program.

Bystander CPR: How to Rescue a Heart

MidMichigan Health is offering a free, one-and-a-half-hour Bystander CPR class, especially for members and friends of Chapel Lane Presbyterian Church. The class is designed for people who don't require a CPR registration card. Bystander CPR is "hands only" and is recognized by the American Heart Association as a viable way to help someone in cardiac arrest. Class participants will also learn to use an automated external defibrillator (AED), similar to the one available at Chapel Lane.

The class will be held at MidMichigan Medical Center-Midland, Conference Room H1602. (Enter at the main entrance to the hospital.) It will be held on **Thursday, April 10, at 6:30 p.m.** Please register by signing the sheet in the narthex, starting in mid-March. We need at least 10 people enrolled for the hospital to offer us this opportunity. Class size is limited to approximately 30. If response warrants, the class will be repeated in early June so that choir members can participate. The event is being arranged by the Session.

Note: This class will duplicate the instruction available on the third Thursday of each month. If you cannot attend the Chapel Lane-sponsored event, consider enrolling for this training instead. To register for this class (not the Chapel Lane-sponsored one), call the Mid-Michigan Health Line at (800) 999-3199.



Haiti January 2014: Minute for Mission

I sit here several days after my return from Haiti, trying to mentally process yet another successful mission. I took a medical and a dental team, which were able to serve hundreds of those suffering from abscessed teeth and many physical ailments. We worked from sun up to sun down, dropping exhausted into our cots at night. I was blessed with such hardworking and passionate folks.

A week in Haiti is never dull and fully challenges us in many ways. Our first night started with a gun battle in the streets outside of our gate and ended with cancelled flights and a long scary drive from Chicago in a snow storm. God carried us and protected us the entire trip. Hope House was full of children when we arrived. They have added 11 more children, since I left in October. These new kids are blessed to be in our care. They came from an American run orphanage in Haiti, which was shut down due to abuse and neglect. I have no words to describe how this sickens me. It is hard enough to see Haitian moms giving up their kids because they cannot feed them, but it is worse to see kids suffer in the hands of those capable to care for them. One little girl, 28 months old, weighed only 12lbs 14 oz. She is nothing but a bag of bones and too weak to even stand. This just overwhelms me with great sadness.

One of our nannies gave birth while I was there. Her baby went into respiratory arrest and was taken to a local hospital. It was touch and go for a couple of days. The mom called very concerned about the health of her baby. I went to the hospital to see how he was progressing. He laid in the NICU, a place that had no ventilators, no way to intubate, and basically non functioning equipment. The doctors and nurses were very caring, but they have very little to work with. I sat watching over so many helpless babies, no bigger than my forearm. So many would never leave this unit, but would join the many other babies that can't survive in Haiti. We are so fortunate to live in a country that has fully functioning medical equipment and resources.

In spite of the sadness, Haiti is a beautiful country and the people possess smiles that just warm my heart. Beyond the smiles it is hard to see all the suffering that lies deep within. The living conditions are slowly improving, the roads are being repaired and there are fewer piles of garbage cluttering up the streets. As I do every trip, I spent an afternoon visiting with Max's family. Even though we do not speak a common language, the love we share is evident to all around us.

God keeps calling me back to this beautiful country, with so many needs. I am blessed that He chose me. I am also blessed to have such a supportive family and church. I could not do God's work without that support. As I write this, I am preparing to take a medical team to Haiti on March 14. As our team pulled away from the gate on that last day, a young woman stood with tears running down her cheeks, pointing to her jaw. Truly heartbreaking, for she may never see a dentist again and she will suffer great pain. God willing, I will be back to help one child at a time, to alleviate as much sickness and suffering as God allows. May GOD bless Haiti.

Congratulations to Dan Veresh and Sara Clark



We will be using a resource entitled “Genesis of Grace: A Lenten Book of Days” by John Indermark. (You may remember Indermark as the author of the marvelous study guide we used for our exploration of Luke’s gospel last year.) We have a good size group of regulars to this study, but there is always room for a few more eager students at the table. So don’t be shy. Join us. You’ll be glad you did. The cost of the study guide is only \$8.00, but apologies go out in advance as not all copies are “clean.” The resource is actually out-of-print and Pastor Rhonda had to order them from used booksellers around the country in order to have sufficient copies for everyone. Some are in good shape; some have notes in the margins; and some are dog-eared. But all share the same message: “One grace and one God are at work in creation and redemption.”



CHECK IT OUT:

Another book recently added to our library is **Jesus and the Riddle of the Dead Sea Scrolls: Unlocking the Secrets of His Life Story** (by Barbara Thiering.) Pastor Rhonda donated this book. The size and appearance of the book is a little intimidating! There are 451 pages, but only 160 pages are “text”, and then pages 161-451 are supportive notes, etc. for the “serious student.” The book is on the shelf with other books about Christ (232.)
